- 2. Show which businesses respond to your needs and wants in a typical day
- 3. Write a list of needs and wants that create opportunities for business. Explain how businesses in your community satisfy three of those needs and wants.
- 4. List needs and wants that could create new business opportunities for you.
- 5. As a Humberside student, list the needs and wants in order of importance to you at school.
- 6. List 2 examples of businesses in your community for each of the following categories: (a) only provide services, (b) provide goods and services, and (c) are business to business consumers. Explain how your choice fit their categories
- 7. Explain in your own words how producers and consumers are interdependent.
- 8. Describe a situation where the following goods could be classified as both a consumer and business to business good: tomatoes, wood, flour, paper, cleaning supplies and desks
- 9. Consider one problem in your community that might create a business opportunity. Why do you think no one has started a business to solve that problem?
- 10. List and explain, in your own words, the five functions of business.
- 11. Select two businesses in your community and compare them in terms of how they use land, capital, labour, technology, and entrepreneurship.
